**Joseph McMillan** is a partner in the Seattle office of the law firm Perkins Coie LLP. He served as co-counsel for Guantanamo detainee Salim Hamdan, whose challenge to the President's system of military commissions was decided by the U.S. Supreme Court in June 2006 in the case Hamdan v. Rumsfeld. Mr. McMillan earned a B.A. and M.A. in history from the University of Iowa, and his J.D. from St. Louis University. When not representing Guantanamo detainees, Mr. McMillan's practice is concentrated in the areas of intellectual property and commercial contract litigation.

**Patrick Reinert** is the Deputy Criminal Chief for Drug Crime for the United States Attorney's Office, Northern District of Iowa.
