Procedural Justice: Perspectives on Summary Judgment, Peremptory Challenges, and the Exclusionary Rule

The *Iowa Law Review* is pleased to announce its 2008 symposium entitled *Procedural Justice: Perspectives on Summary Judgment, Peremptory Challenges, and the Exclusionary Rule*. The symposium will be held on February 29, 2008, at the UI College of Law. During the event, distinguished scholars will explore the use and constitutionality of three procedural exclusionary devices: (1) motions for summary judgment, (2) *Batson* challenges during jury selection, and (3) the exclusionary rule in criminal cases following the Supreme Court's decision in *Hudson v. Michigan*. Each panel will be moderated by a judge from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit. Over the lunch hour, the symposium will feature a panel of judges from the Eighth Circuit who will answer questions and discuss issues relating to procedural issues in the federal judiciary today.
