Law & History Review <http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/lhr>

Submit your manuscript on their website, with a 200 word abstract of the manuscript and a biographical paragraph attached. Convert all footnotes to endnotes for editorial phase. Follow *The Chicago Manual of Style* for style, not the Bluebook.

Journal of Legal History (UK) <http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/flgh>

Submit your manuscript on their website. Details of the author's institutional affiliation, full address and other contact information, including an e-mail address, should be included on a separate cover sheet. Any acknowledgements should be included on the cover sheet. The journal uses a unique style that is explained on their website.

Submit by email or by mail in quadruplicate. Must include a three-hundred-word abstract that outlines the substance and significance of the work, identify anyone who has critiqued the manuscript, and list the author's contact information. Manuscripts should not exceed 10,000 words, excluding notes, tables, and figures. The notes should not exceed 5,000 words.

American Historical Review http://www.indiana.edu/~ahrweb/article_submission_guide.html

Submit by email, with your manuscript not exceeding 8,000 words, excluding notes, tables and figures. While the manuscript topic may be specific, the journal only selects manuscripts that would appeal to a large selection of historians around the world.

American Journal of Legal History <http://www.temple.edu/law/ajlh/submissions.html>

Submit your manuscript on their website. Manuscripts should be formatted in Microsoft Word and footnotes should follow the current edition of the Bluebook, ALWD Manual or the MLA Style Guide. Publication decisions usually occur within 8 to 12 weeks of receiving the manuscript.

Journal of Southern History <http://www.law.mercer.edu/academics/jslh>

Manuscripts can be emailed or submitted by mail. To submit by mail, two hard copies and a disc copy must be mailed. Manuscripts are preferred to be no more than 35 pages, excluding notes and illustrations.

Submit your manuscript on their website. Follow *The Chicago Manual of Style* for style, not the Bluebook. Manuscripts should be between 6,000 and 8,000 words for text and footnotes. Take note of the specific style used for footnotes as described on their website.

This journal does not take submissions from students from other law schools. Manuscripts must be emailed without any identifying information in the document.

Buffalo Law Review (not specifically for legal history) <http://buffalolawreview.org/submissions.php>

Manuscripts can be emailed or submitted by postal mail. Along with the manuscript, a cover letter and curriculum vitae must be attached. The subject line of the email should be: "Article Submission: [Author Name]" to properly identify the submission.

Manuscripts must be submitted on their website. The manuscript should run between 8,000 to 14,000 words (25-45 pages).

Journal of Legal Pluralism <http://www.jlp.bham.ac.uk/authorguide.htm>

Submit your manuscript either by email or by mail. Do not use tabs or double/multiple spaces, all tables must be created using the table-function in Word, and several other style distinctions are listed on their website. With your manuscript, attach your biographical information and an abstract of your article about 250 words in length.

Manuscripts must be emailed. This journal may not be still publishing as their website is out of date.

Manuscripts may be submitted by mail or e-mail, but either way must contain an electronic version. They request manuscripts "on any aspect of the ancient, medieval, or modern civilian tradition."
